


1st Thurstaston 0 - Barbarians 1

Geoffrey Beavan Challenge Camp

The Geoffrey Beavan Challenge Camp was held over the weekend of the 5th, 6th and 7th October. The competition was for teams of 3 split into junior, senior and explorer/young leaders. The junior competition was for scouts up to 12 and a half years old, senior scouts up to age 14 and a half and an explorers/young leaders section.

 $\mathbf{1}^{\text{st}}$ Thurstaston entered 2 teams into the junior competition and 2 teams into the senior competition. Additionally Bethan Jenkins joined with explorers from $\mathbf{4}^{\text{th}}$ Moreton to form a combined team and Issac Lanceley joined with scouts from $\mathbf{1}^{\text{st}}$ Frankby/Greasby in the junior competition.

Over the weekend the teams competed in a variety of challenges. These included: a low ropes course, a first aid challenge, catapults, shooting, a mountain bike ride, a night hike and a camp project. The camp project involved the teams devising a way of dropping an egg from approximately 2 meters onto the ground without it breaking.



We shared our camp with 4th Moreton Scout Group. As can be seen from the photo below both sets of children get on really well.



1st Thurstaston did not win any of the competitions in their own right (see column to the right about Issac's success). However we did have the best teams in the First Aid challenge in both the junior and senior competitions.
