Cycling over the Pennines on the Longdendale Trail

Trail cycling is a favourite activity of 1st Barnston Scouts and the Group fits in a trail ride most months. One of the trails featured in many rides by Barnston scouts last year is the Transpennine Trail (TPT). The TPT is a classic long-distance trail (215-miles) for walkers, cyclists and horse-riders across the breadth of England from Southport to Hornsea. It forms part of the European Long Distance Path E8 from Istanbul in Turkey to Cork in Ireland.

1st Barnston Scouts have covered many of the local sections of the trail on day rides, with the ultimate aim as a troop to cumulatively cover the whole trail. Our latest TPT ride before the winter saw us push our route out up and over the Pennines, cycling the 15-mile Longdendale Trail section of

the TPT from Hadfield to Penistone. The trail follows the line of the old Woodhead Railway up the east-west Longdendale Valley. The trail is traffic-free and keeps to the south side of the valley away from the growl of Sheffield-bound traffic on the busy A628.

Early one Saturday morning, seven scouts and four adults loaded up the transit with their bikes and kit and headed out east along the M56, M60, and M67 to Hadfield. This typical High Peak Derbyshire village (on the border with Greater Manchester) is best known as its TV fictional double 'Royston



Vasey' (The League of Gentlemen). We parked up in the trailhead car park near the station and headed out east on the old Woodhead line in a deep cutting. The ride is easy going and you don't notice the slight uphill gradient. After about a mile of cycling we suddenly emerged from the cutting and caught sight of the view of Longdendale with its chain of reservoirs running down from the Woodhead Pass. The trail surface is made of compacted gravel and gives a good foundation to ride on even in the wet. Initially the trail keeps to the high side of the valley with the reservoirs far below.

There is one crossing of a minor road before arriving at Torside, where we took a short break.

From Torside onwards the valley narrows and the scenery is dominated by the high moorland. We soon arrived at the old

Crowden Station, where the station buildings still stand, now as private house, but the platforms have long disappeared. We're now on the last pull up to the main feature of this old railway line, the Woodhead Tunnels. The old railway line part of the trail ends at the entrance to the Woodhead Tunnels. There are three tunnels, with the newest one (Woodhead 3) now being refurbished to carry the main electricity cables from Yorkshire to Manchester.] There then follows a rugged section over the moor and across Windle Edge, the highest point of the TPT (435m/1427') before we drop down to Dunford Bridge and the eastern portal of the Woodhead Tunnel.



Stepping over from Derbyshire to West Yorkshire called for an investiture! At Dunford Bridge, at the start of the Upper Don Valley section of the ride, we invested Rosie into the Group.

It was soon time to ride on, following the route of the eastern section of the Woodhead Line, paralleling the young River Don as we dropped down from the heights into Penistone, finally finishing our ride at Penistone Station where we met our support crew.





It was then time to pack up and head back home but we took a slight detour to Holmfirth, home of another TV classic 'Last of the Summer Wine'. We sadly just missed a cup of tea at Sid and Ivy's café but we did manage to replenish our 'carbs' with some

but we did manage to replenish our 'carbs' with some Yorkshire fish and chips and to eat them while sitting on Norah Batty's steps!



As we travelled back over Holme Moss we discovered how lucky we had been with the weather as the heavens then opened and pelted us with a terrific hailstone storm. This is a great one-day ride, mainly on safe off-road trails. It was also good preparation for our expedition and a good place to end our year's cycling on the TPT.
