As a Scout Group we have taken part in JOTI (Jamboree on the Internet) over the last few years but this year was the best ever. JOTI gives the opportunity for Scouts to speak with other Scouts from across the world. JOTI is run on the same weekend in October that JOTA (Jamboree on the Air) takes place.

JOTI is easy to take part in with a laptop connected to the internet (we used a tethered mobile phone to provided internet access). There are several ways that the organisers facilitate contact between Scout Groups.

This year greater emphasis was placed on using Skype and a dedicated Facebook page was set up to allow users around the world to leave their Skype addresses.

Our JOTI event, which included a sleepover at the hut, started at 11am. By 11.05 we had already spoken with a Scout Group in Madagascar, it was that quick and easy! We carried on making and receiving Skype calls to late into the afternoon and the list of countries we spoke to is as follows (some of the countries we spoke to more than one Group in):

Japan, New Zealand, Australia, Pakistan, Philippines, USA, Canada, Guatemala, Costa Rica, Puerto Rica, Argentina, South Africa, Nigeria, Germany, Sweden, UK, Portugal, Austria, Malta, Denmark, Greece, Netherlands, Spain, Madagascar, Taiwan, Ireland and India.

It was good for the Scouts to try to speak to other Scouts from around the world. We even had one of our Scouts trying out his German and Chinese language skills (not sure if the Scouts in Taiwan understood him but they did smile politely!). Funniest moment of JOTI was speaking to the Japanese Scout Group. Not much speaking actually but lots of bowing at the screen and much laughter.

As well as the JOTI activity the Scouts also built go-karts from pallets and launched them down the drive to the Scout hut. Pizza and chips, a camp fire and film rounded off a great day.



More than 200 Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and Explorers visited St John's and St Peter's Church in Crosby to be presented with their awards.

The awards are given to young people who complete outdoor and adventure challenges to the best of their ability, helping them to engage and support in their personal development. Explorer Scout, John Lennon said: "It was amazing to receive my award after months of activities, planning and undergoing our expedition.

"It was great to be able to celebrate it alongside other Explorers who received the same award too."

Bear Grylls said: "Every child has a right to have an adventure. "Life is about grabbing opportunities. The prizes don't always go to the biggest, the best and strongest – they go to those who persevere.

"These are simple life lessons that Scouting teaches people."

West Wirral Climbing, Abseiling and Hill Walking

The District can offer climbing and abseiling sessions for Scouts and Explorers at Irby quarry in the evenings or at weekends

In the evenings sessions would be approx. 2 hrs. long (7.00pm to 9:00pm) but we can be flexible with times and dates.

At the weekends, we are currently offering Saturdays on:

We may be able to offer Sunday or alternate dates on request.

Sessions would be approx. 2.5 hrs., with one session in the morning and one in the afternoon. (10:00 to 12:30 and 13:00 to 15:30).

Each session can accommodate 15 climbers/abseilers at a time.

All equipment and instruction is provided, but a leader will need to be present.

Session can be booked exclusively for a single troop/unit, or can be made up from separate groups and individuals. Sessions are £5 per climber, or an exclusive session for £60 per session.

Climbing sessions and courses can also be offered at different locations if you have any specific requests.

We are also able to help you get your Scouts or Explorers out walking if you do not hold a Scouting walking permit. We can provide training and guidance in navigation and equipment...or just help in getting out onto the hills for the day.
