4th Heswall Beavers grow seeds from space!



Children at 4th Heswall Beaver Scouts have become space biologists and are embarking on a voyage of discovery by growing seeds that have been into space.

In September, 2kg of rocket seeds were flown to the International Space Station (ISS) on Soyuz 44S where they spent several months in microgravity before returning to Earth in March 2016. The seeds have been sent as part of Rocket Science, an educational project launched by the RHS Campaign for School Gardening and the UK Space Agency.

4th Heswall Beavers are one of up to 10,000 schools and groups to receive a packet of 100 seeds from space, which they are growing alongside seeds that haven't been to space and measure the differences over seven weeks. The children don't know which seed packet, Red or Blue, contains which seeds until all results have been collected by the RHS Campaign for School Gardening and analysed by professional biostatisticians.

The out-of-this-world, nationwide science experiment will enable the children to think more about how we could preserve human life on another planet in the future, what astronauts need to survive long-term missions in space and the difficulties surrounding growing fresh food in challenging climates.



Beaver Leader. Mo Barker says: "We are very excited to be taking part in Rocket Science. This experiment is a fantastic way of teaching our children to think more scientifically and share their findings with the whole community."



Rocket Science is just one educational project from a programme developed by the UK Space Agency to celebrate British ESA astronaut Tim Peake's Principia mission to the ISS and inspire young people to look into careers in STEM (science, technology, engineering and maths) subjects, including horticulture.

Pictures below show the Beavers with some of the seeds sown and taking the first measurements of the plants. The boys' current prediction is that the red packet seeds are the ones that have been to space.

1st Barnston Cubs Visit Techniquest



On a bright sunny Spring Saturday in May, 10 Cubs and 3 Leaders from 1st Barnston gathered at Heswall Station for a day trip to Techniquest Glyndŵr in Wrexham. Techniquest Glyndŵr is an interactive hands-on science centre based on the Glyndŵr University campus. It is open daily, except Mondays, and is very suitable for young people of primary school age. The centre comprises 5 interactive science zones and a science theatre. There are also add-on workshop laboratories for pre-booked group/school visits and TechZone, a robotics Lego discovery centre, which runs on one Saturday every month. In the winter months the centre runs astronomy activities on some evenings. Full details about the Centre can be found online at: http://www.tqg.org.uk/visiting/

We planned on doing roughly one zone every half hour and we were soon getting our hands on activities underway in zone. We were very lucky to have visited on a very quiet day and cubs were able to spend a lot of time on each and every exhibit, with Kieran helping out with the harder-to-understand science bits.

We enjoyed a packed lunch outside in the sunshine in the gardens and soon afterwards we gathered in the science theatre for the science show led by Katie. Today's show was called Music Makers and was all about making sounds and musical instruments. We got to see sound waves make gloop dance; tried out making sounds with tuning forks, balloons, and wine glasses; and, produced some really loud and deep burps and grunts using string, cups, buckets and bins!





After the show we continued on our zone visits getting to see and do more hands-on science, including the disorienting mirror maze. For the last half hour Kieran treated us to some science tricks outside including those with balloons and balancing cups. Our visit ended with a ten minute rummage in the shop before we waved our hosts goodbye and set off for the station.



Just after 5.15pm the train full of tired cubs pulled into Heswall Station. It was a great day out and packed in lots of activities towards the Scientist badge. Our thanks go to the staff at Techniquest Glyndŵr for making it a really enjoyable day visit.

Brief History of the West Wirral Theatre Group

In 2000, following our highly successful Millennium Gang Show, a small group of the cast approached the Gang Show committee to ask if they could set up a theatre group. The committee were delighted to support the idea and the WWGS Theatre Group was launched in September 2000. The Group is open to active members of the Guide and Scout Associations between the ages of 10 and 25 within the catchment area of West Wirral Gang Show and, although most of the current memberships are also cast members of the Gang Show you do not need to have been in the Gang Show to join. Indeed, several talented members of subsequent Gang Shows joined via the Theatre Group rather than vice versa.

As far as we know, this is the only Theatre Group attached to a Gang Show in the UK, making our Theatre Group quite unique. The Group is run by its younger members, with support from a small group of adults who have a wealth of experience in theatre. The group runs in alternative years to the Gang Show offering some continuity to cast members who want to keep on performing.

In the past the Theatre group has produced some excellent shows including "Return to the Forbidden Planet", an "Expression of Youth", "Cinderella" in 2007, "Snow White" in 2009 and in 2011 the spectacular "Treasure Island". The last three productions were entirely written, produced and performed by the Theatre Group, and were completely sold out for all of the performances.

The Theatre Group would welcome new members interested in the Theatre (on-stage or backstage) and we would again stress that you do not have to be a member of our Gang Show to join (although you do need to be an active member of the Guide or Scout Movements)


