I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the parents that come along to the work days, and would like for everyone to acknowledge the efforts in particular of Dave Reed and more recently Jon Oliver and Robert Oliver who are involved on a more regular basis with its upkeep.

It is an appropriate time to thank everyone for the cooperation shown over the access issues to the site and in particular the car park. We will have to continue to use the Village Car Park until the safety concerns with the Village Hall have been addressed. Your patience in the matter is appreciated.

You will have had emails, from the Group on a regular basis for activities, etc; at the bottom of the email is a number of links. Can I use this occasion to promote them?.

The first Easy Fundraising, if you buy goods online via this link you will pay the same price, and the outlet donates to us.

The second is Easy search, when you go home set this as your search engine and again we receive a donation.

And lastly, the Group's website. If you can make a mental note to browse occasionally at the 1st Thurstaston website -www.firstthurstaston.co.uk - save it on your favourites. It is an opportunity for the parents to see the children enjoying themselves. It is with great appreciation to Dave for keeping it up to date with the latest events and photos of past adventures.

The main focus of this year's fundraising has been to replace the mini bus. There have been a number of events throughout the year. The main regular, annual fundraising events are of course the Christmas Scout post, the Jumble Sale, the Xmas Fair and the Easter Fair, the 100 club and of course, a big thank you to the Irby Club for their regular raffle held to support us. In addition to those events, from which most of the money raised has been diverted into the minibus fund, there have been special events such as sponsored walks, games nights, and of course our latest social event is the Music Quiz night on the Friday 9th July. We have set a target amount of £10,000 and we currently have around £4,000 so we are well on the way. Thank you for your continued support, and if you wish to join the 100 club or join us on the social night then please see Sue, or myself at the end of the meeting.

It has been busy year for all the sections this will be covered shortly by the GSL and by the section leaders.

Before that, may I please pass you over to Doug for the Treasurer's Report?

Treasurer's Report - AGM 2010

In a bid to keep costs down, we have not printed as many copies of the accounts this year but should anyone want a copy please ask me later and I'll send you a copy.

I'm pleased to say that the accounts have been checked and audited by an independent auditor and found to be in good order.

In summary:-

Receipts this year are up on last year – from £25,259 to £33,034.

Expenditure is also up, but only slightly – from £26,219 to £26,254. Unlike previous years we have not had any major expenditure on refurbishment of the HQ.

Fundraising income is up by over £1000 on last year. A total of £9,368 was raised. All fundraising at the moment is going towards a new minibus which we are hoping to purchase this year.

Takings from the weekly Irby Club draw are slightly down by £340 on last year but still realised a very useful profit of over £1,300.

The profit from the 100 Club was disappointingly low this year at only £216 and we would certainly welcome more members. With more members we will be able to increase prizes and also increase the profit.

Jumble sales continue to be a good source of income – takings this year were up from £1,596 to £1,867 and profit up from £1,454 to £1,595.

The Sainsbury's bag pack and sponsored walk have also raised useful funds.

The biggest fundraiser is currently the Christmas Scout Post – this year the income was slightly up on the previous year at £2,371.

Thank you to everyone who has helped with fund raising in the past year and thank you in anticipation to all those who will help in the future. More helpers and participants are always welcome.

Gift Aid – if you sign the Gift Aid declaration we can claim a tax refund on your subscriptions. This costs you nothing but in the last year resulted in a very useful refund of £1,238 to the group. If you are a tax payer and haven't yet signed up please consider doing so.

HQ Running Costs – we've spent a bit more on electricity and a bit less on water this year but overall expenditure is down from over £8,000 to around £4,000 – due largely to the rewiring costs last year.

Transport Costs – slightly down on last year from £1,973 to £1,707 – slightly less being spent on maintenance and repair this year. However, conscious of the fact that the minibus isn't getting any younger and repair bills are likely to increase, as mentioned earlier, we are hoping to replace the bus this year.

Activities – you will notice that income and expenditure have both increased dramatically: Income from £6,862 to £12,924 and expenditure from £7,417 to £13,296. This is entirely due to the increase in group numbers and increase in group activities so can only be viewed as a good thing and a sign of a thriving group.

Subscriptions - we reviewed the method of collecting subs last year and quite a few of you are now paying by bank standing order. This has proved much simpler for us and I would ask others who are still paying in the old fashioned way by cheque or cash to consider changing.

And finally, as in previous years we have reviewed the amount of subs. In light of the present financial climate we are proposing to keep the increase to the minimum. I propose that the subs are increased by £1 per term from £32 to £33 and put this proposal to the meeting.

GSL's Report – AGM 2010

This year has been one of many firsts, and some fantastic achievements continuing to build on our already successful history. Today I am going to share some highlights with you. The year got off to a great start with the award by District of the President's Prize – Best Scout Group of the Year. In July I was nominated for and then won my category of the Wirral CVS Volunteer of the Year awards. I tell you this not to blow my own trumpet (although it was a lovely surprise) but because I wouldn't have won it unless I had been part of this very successful Scout Group.

We returned in September with renewed enthusiasm after a welcome summer break to start a busy term of Scouting.

In October Paul Oliver, one of our Asst. Cub Leaders, attended the Queen's Scout Award Presentations accompanied by his very proud parents Jon & Jayne.

November saw us attending the County Chief Scout Awards in Liverpool; we took around 25 Beavers and Cubs to collect their Bronze and Silver Awards with their proud parents also in attendance. We also packed the local church, St Bart's, at our annual Church Parade for Remembrance Sunday.

December was consumed by selling Scout Christmas Post stamps and then sorting and delivering the cards, well worth the effort with our biggest cheque ever, delivering over 15,000 Christmas cards, thanks to everyone who got involved with the post.

2010 arrived and in January we completed the annual Census, this year we recorded our highest membership for over 10 years with 101 members.

In February we attended the Scout Post Presentation to collect our cheque and the Leaders and Exec Team had their annual Christmas Night out – yes I know it was Feb – but we are just too busy in Dec !

In March having just collected the cheque for the last Christmas Post – I attended the first meeting of the year for the 2010 scheme so you can see how much time goes into organising the post, we finish one year and start the next! We haven't had a Christmas Post Organiser for several years now, I have done it – if anyone would be interested in taking on this role please see me later!

We attended the WW Gang Show in April and watched one of our own performing – Matty, our Young Leader, was part of the cast and Paul Oliver part of the crew, it was the best Gang Show I have seen in years. Later in the month we were very proud to lead the District St George's Day Parade in West Kirby as President's Prize Holders with a great turnout from each Section.

Early in May we held our now annual Group Camp and had 18 Scouts, 18 Cubs and 18 Beavers, accompanied by 12 Leaders camped overnight and enjoy a circus theme camp – another great success enjoyed by all who attended.

Later in that month we provided the Colour Party as President's Prize Holders for the District AGM and we were delighted to be awarded the Reg Cook Trophy for Best Beaver Colony of the Year and also the Dave Blackwood Trophy for the Scout Troop who achieve the most 'out' in Scouting. Congratulations to both Leader Teams, very well deserved. Jon Oliver was awarded a Chief Scout's Commendation for Good Service – well done Jon.

In June this year we have had two very special events, both firsts in our history - on June 8th we opened a new Beaver Colony and welcomed 9 new Beavers to join 9 existing Beavers to form Ismay Colony on a Tuesday Night – thanks to Cath Corby and Jo Boots for stepping up and enabling this to happen. Thor Colony continues on a Thursday also with 18 Beavers.

Last week another first - we welcomed our first young lady to Cubs and hope to have another join us in the next week or two, we have always wanted to welcome girls into the Group but it is more difficult when you have very successful Rainbows, Brownies and Guides locally as we do. Mixed Sections change the dynamics of the group for the better and we hope to continue to grow our female membership.

All of the above – everything you have heard about today is made possible by one very special group of people – the Leader Team. In Scouts, Andy, Julie, Keith and our recent recruits Alan and Kath with regular help at Camps from Steve and Chris. A mention also those on the Dad's rota at Scouts, Robin, Gary, Neil and Steve who help out each term. In Cubs, Debbie, Paul and Jane and in Beavers, Jayne, Cath, Jo, Ellie, Emily and Sue and last but not least Jon my AGSL. Not only do they run the meetings each week but they put in a huge amount of extra hours you don't see, prep for the meetings, paperwork, keeping the accounts, getting the equipment together and setting up camps. They have facilitated more than 400 nights away for your children in the last 12 months, and attended around 60 extra events and activities across the Sections, we are very lucky to have them and I would like them all to stand and take a round of applause.

Another Group who need our thanks are the Executive Committee team, Ray Dugdale our Chair retired at Christmas – we are extremely grateful for the many years of dedicated and loyal service he has given to this Group, Rob Noble and Wendy Thompson have also decided to stand down and we thank them both sincerely for all their help and support over the many years they have been with the Group. With the help of Chris Hurley and Keith Quayle we finished the month at the Great Escape before a well-earned 2 week Easter break. At the Great Escape, both teams did extremely well scoring an average of 8/10 on each base and were placed in the top 15 teams out of 65.

April

On Thursday the 15th April the Scouts practiced their fire lighting skills in preparation for the Backwoods Cooking competition. St Georges Day parade was on Sunday 25th with 17 scouts managing to make it.

May

to take part in canoe training. We hope to make this event a regular part of our annual activities.
