Chair's Report – AGM 2011

Another busy year for 1st Thurstaston Scout Group, the fund raising programme has consisted primarily of, the Jumble Sale, the Firework evening, and the Christmas and Easter Fairs, and of course the Scout post. As you are aware these events allow us to keep the cost of the subscriptions lower than is required to cover our running costs, and I am sure you will appreciate the purchase of the much needed replacement mini bus which has now been acquired.

Having reviewed last year's events I now have great pleasure in informing you that this year we are proposing to continue with, the two fairs at Easter and Christmas, the 100 club, the Firework night, the Scout Post, but we will be introducing a Summer Games Night, a sponsored Coastal Walk, and Plant and Bulbs Sales. Sadly we are no longer supported by the very much appreciated Irby Club Draw, and also, we will not be having the Jumble Sales in the foreseeable future. This is because we no longer have the manpower to facilitate them. These activities take a tremendous amount of effort from the committee, their families and friends, the leaders, parents and anyone else we can get to help us. I would like to take this opportunity to thank them all for their support.

We are in the fortunate position to have a Scout hut with great grounds, but it should be noted that they take a great deal of time and effort to maintain. Just the upkeep of the grass to an acceptable height is a challenge. The grounds improvement this year includes the Cooking Shelter Base, which I am sure will be utilised fully on our Family Games night in the summer. A big thank you to Andy, Jon and Robert Oliver, and Dave Reed, and all those that have given their time to assist in the work-days, that are so necessary to keep the site well maintained.

Following on from the situation with regards to parking, it is an appropriate time to thank everyone for the cooperation shown over the access issues to the site. As we have no way of resolving the safety concerns shared by the Group and the Village Hall, we will need to park away in the Village car park and walk down for the foreseeable future.

The Group's website has gone from strength to strength with Dave at the helm, it's full of information and pictures, not only all the current events but past events also.

And lastly, a big thank you to Doug and Marjorie for their work in the Group over the years, their time and support in the committee has been always appreciated and we are sorry to see them go.

It has been busy year for all the sections this will be covered shortly by the GSL, but before that, may I please pass you over to Doug for his final Treasurer's Report.

Treasurer's Report - AGM 2011

In summary:-

Receipts this year are up on last year by just over £1000 to £34,228

Expenditure is also up, and more than usual, from £26K to £31K but this does include over £4K spent on our new minibus.

Fund raising income is down from £9,368 to £8,061.

Unfortunately the Irby Club draw came to an end in December after many fruitful years however it still raised over £700.

The profit from the 100 Club is up on last year with a profit of £360 but we would certainly welcome more members. With more members we will be able to increase prizes and also increase the profit.

Jumble sale takings down from £1,867 to £1,682 and profit down to £1,487 this year.

The biggest fund raiser continues to be the Christmas Scout Post – this year the income was slightly up on the previous year at £2,394.

Gift Aid – if you sign the Gift Aid declaration we can claim a tax refund on your subscriptions. This costs you nothing but in the last year resulted in a very useful refund of over £1,700. If you are a tax payer and haven't yet signed up please consider doing so.

HQ Running Costs –no major change to running costs – up about £600 from last year and this included a hopefully one off payment of over £400 for a new water boiler.

Transport Costs – much higher this year but largely due to the purchase of a new minibus for £4434.

Activities – income and expenditure on activities both slightly down on last year.

Subscriptions – and finally to subscriptions. Your subscriptions only go part way to funding the group operations. These need to be supplemented by fund raising activities and this year we have seen the demise of the Irby Club draw which at its height was bringing in over £1500 a year.

Certain fund raising activities have not proved popular with parents and consequently a great deal of effort has rested on only a few regular shoulders. As a result of this we have decided to stop running jumble sales in future. Jumble sales typically also bring in about £1500 a year.

The committee is continually reviewing ideas for raising money but for the moment we need to make up some of the shortfall. We propose raising the subs from £8.25 to £9 per month, or if you pay each term an increase from £33 to £36 each term. I propose that the increase be effective from September 2011.

To Doug Funnell our outgoing Treasurer for many, many years of support both on the Exec committee and most recently as Treasurer, I think Doug's son is now in his 30's so that will tell you how long he has been involved, Doug has decided to hang up his hat but I would like to record our grateful thanks for everything he has done over the years. Also to Marjorie Reed who stepped into the breach this time last year and agreed to be our Secretary when no one else would do it – thanks for your excellent record keeping and your many hours of support behind the scenes especially in the Jumble sales. Marjorie has agreed to stay on the committee which is great news thanks. Finally to Dave Reed our President who continues to support me and the Group quietly in the background ensuring we don't miss anything, picking up errors in the minutes (every month) and providing the voice of wisdom and calm which we all need from time to time – thank you.

In July we went 10 pin bowling at Bromborough and had a great fun. The following week we had a great evening crabbing at West Kirby Marine Lake. For the final week before the summer holidays we were supposed to do backwoods cooking but it poured down so we made biscuits instead and completed the Fire Evacuation practice.

Chamboree Camp – Aug 2010 what a great experience, the Cubs attended for the weekend and completed so many activities, have you had a look at the photos on the web album or the blog I did from camp, well worth a look, both are on the Group web site

We started back in Sept with a games night and welcomed some new starters. The following weeks saw us start work on our Road Safety Badge and complete a badge review with the Cubs looking at which badges they would like to do. In late Sept 28 Cubs and the Leaders set off for the District camp at QCW, where they completed the Navigator and Naturalist badges. This was the first camp for several Cubs and they all did really well and thoroughly enjoyed themselves, well done!

The week after camp we all visited the Leasowe Lighthouse for a spectacular night time view out over the Dee and towards Liverpool. The Cubs really enjoyed the visit and learned much about the history of the Lighthouse, the people who have lived there, and its restoration.

For the rest of October before half term we completed the Road Safety badge which included a walk into the Village and practising the skills we had learned. The week before half term saw us wrapping and filling shoe boxes with gifts for Operation Christmas Child to send to children less fortunate than ourselves and we also watched a short DVD about the shoe boxes, where they go and the difference they make to the children who receive them.

Back to Cubs in Nov after the Bonfire Night party and display on 5th which we all attended. We had an evening of activities with a Judo taster session provided by Chris from Judo Education, great time had by all 'throwing' each other (in a controlled way) to the floor! We split into two groups, one did Judo and the other visited the recycle bay at Tesco as part of the Global Challenge to see what household goods can and can't be recycled and then swapped so we had a go at both activities.

Later in the month we visited the new Lifeboat Station House at Hoylake where we invested all the new Cubs. We gave £150 to the RNLI from the very generous donations from the Cubs and their parents. Also that month The County Chief Scout Award presentations took place, attending and receiving the Chief Scout Silver Award the highest award available to Cubs are Will Taylor, Fraser Wright, Matthew Costall, Kieran Barnes, Riley Nolan and Ben Grinstead. Many congratulations to them all. Some of the Cubs attended a District Children In Need event at Europa Pools to raise some funds and have some fun. We had a visit from Mrs Jones the local Lollipop lady to reinforce our road safety skills.

During December we don't meet at the hut because of the Scout Post, Nov 29th was the Christmas Fair and on Dec 6th we attended the District Cub Carol Service at Holy Family Church, Pensby. The last meeting in December saw us on a joint trip with the Scouts to Awesome Walls Climbing House in Liverpool.

In January we returned with a games night and then started work on the Communicator badge, later in the month we did a night hike, a circular route from Parkgate an absolutely freezing night, but a great time was had by all. We also took part in the District 5 a side Football Competition and had our best result ever, progressing past the league stage into the quarter finals, where we were knocked out! So that meant we were a very worthy 5th place.

During February we continued our work on the Communicator badge, learning how to take messages carefully and follow instructions, we made Peter Pan and Samurai hats in Origami. On Sunday 13th Feb a group of Cubs attended an indoor Canoe Taster run by WGSCA at Guinea Gap baths and had a great time. The following Monday we completed the Posters for the District competition and had an interesting talk about amateur radio and walkie-talkies from Vic an old Scout and Venture Leader from our Group. During half term we took a group of Cubs to the Wirral Scout and Guide Theatre Group's Treasure Island on the Saturday and then another group of Cubs represented the pack at the District Swimming Gala where we came a very creditable 5th from the 15 packs that took part, well done to the Cubs who swam so well, special mention to Dan Cooke who came second in the under 11 freestyle so is officially the second fastest Cub on the Wirral! At the end of Feb we visited the Kailash Buddhist Centre in Prenton, I have to say it was the most peaceful, tranquil Cub night I have ever been to, all the Cubs quietly meditating absolutely wonderful!

Early in March we had a visit from Chris Hughes the ACC Scouts and he is also the Merseyside Contingent Unit Leader for the Jamboree in Sweden this summer, he brought with him two Explorers, brothers Aaron and James who are also part of Unit. They told us all about the training they have done so far for the Jamboree and what they are going to be up to as well as the Jamboree itself in the summer. It will certainly be an experience of a lifetime for all those involved and we have asked them to come back maybe in the autumn to tell us all about their Jamboree experiences. On the 14th March we held our Comic Relief night all the Cubs, yes all of them attended in fancy dress and we had some fantastic outfits. The Cubs paid to wear their fancy dress, bought cakes and learned how to Street Dance with Sarah Jayne a local dance teacher from Irby. We had a really enjoyable evening and raised £180 – fantastic! During that week also Grey Six attended the District Poster Competition final. There is another article and picture of those able to attend and represent Grey Six elsewhere. The next Monday in March was World Water Day and our Young Leader Matty put together a programme for us based on cleaning and purifying water, which we did through a series of filters and then boiling the water to make it safe to drink (although it still didn't look too nice!). There were a number of activity bases on the Saturday including Shooting, Crate Staking, Cooking and Pioneering.

October

The event was carried out over two days and included hiking, canoeing, low ropes, first aid, camp challenge and shooting. Given this was our first time in a while we were placed well in events such as First Aid and Low Ropes. On the 15th October we went Ice-skating at Deeside Arena with the usual minor bumps and bruises. On the 22nd we carried out work towards the Global Challenge which included talking about international issues and multiple-choice.
