The accounts have been verified by our external auditor.

Just a few things to note:

Increase in new members has brought a £1600 increase in subs.

Which has also increased the capitation contribution to District.

There has been no gift aid claim for financial year 21, which will mean there are 2 in financial year 22.

There has been an increase in expenses nearly £13k (2k new equipment, £1k increase in insurance, £3k maintenance costs, £1k hospitality) and the increase in utilities that we have all been noticing at home as well.

There have been some fun times courtesy of the group, a trip to the maize maze, a group camp, new T-shirts and I believe we are now welcoming squirrels!!

So just to finish up my last ever AGM, last yet we closed our books on £50,982.78 this year we are closing on £45,912.72 a loss for the year of £5070.06.

Ismay, Royden and Thor Beaver Colonies report 2021/22

Since our last reports the Beavers have been busy joining in and having fun with different types of activities, events and sleepovers.

When we returned in September after the summer break the Beavers joined in with the Cubs and Scouts with a trip to the Maize Maze in Brimstage. They enjoyed finding their way out of the Maze and coming across signposts telling them about the different things that they had to look out for along their way and having their picture taken with some of the statues. They went on the Go carts, a giant inflatable, Zip wire and many more activities. The Beavers have learnt how to do basic First Aid e.g. - what to do in the case of an Emergency, how to get help, how to treat cuts, grazes, apply bandages and bleeding. They have been cleaning up the local area with a litter pick around Irby park and surrounding area. All three Colonies had a visit to the Adventureland in New Brighton. The Beavers learnt about Parliament and Rememberance, painted pottery; which was brought in from the "Potting shed" in Hoylake. In October and November Sue brought in Guide dog "Lily" who she is training, and talked about the important work that the Guide Dog association do, this was a very interesting evening. Some of the Beavers and their leader team attended the District Beaver Carol Service, which was held at St. Andrew's Church in West Kirby, the theme of the service was "Light of the World". After the service the Beavers took home a bag of Christmas gifts and there was a collection in aid of the Guide dogs. In March they attended the District activity afternoon which was held at 1st West Kirby Scout hut, where they learnt different skills, e.g. building and lighting a fire, tent pitching, packing a sleeping bag & rucksack, for a hike or camp, tying shoelaces and knots, these are just a few of the activities. The Beavers have been taking part in team games and problem solving as part of some of the meetings. We have had a visit from Professor Bunsen at our sleepovers, he

showed the Beavers different types of science activities and had them making coloured slime, sherbet and glow sticks, which they all thoroughly enjoyed making. This was followed by singing camp songs around the fire and making Smores, before watching a film and going to bed. The Beavers have also been climbing at the Boulder hut, been on a hike along the Wirral way from Thurstaston to West Kirby, with chips at the end which were enjoyed by all. Some of the Beavers have been on a bike ride from Thurstaston to Ashton Park in West Kirby and back to Thurstaston, this again was enjoyed by all. We have been Shelter building in Royden park and learnt how to Navigate. These are just a few of the activities that the Beaver Colonies have been doing over the last year.

has meant we have reverted to two troops. Martin troop meeting on a Tuesday and Richardson troop meeting on a Thursday.


We have even managed to acquire some Young Leaders, India and Nat joining Dan to help the Leader Team. However we are always looking for more help!

 activities on and in the water.


























And we have another winner
